JOHNNY APPLESEED

The Peas will be performing 3:30 Sunday, September 16th at Linvilla Orchard. Appropriately this month's featured Pea is John Chapman, AKA Johnny Appleseed.

He was born September 26, 1774, around the time of the Battle of Bunker Hill, in Massachusetts to Minuteman Nathaniel Chapman and wife, Elizabeth. Johnny's mother died giving birth to son, Nathaniel, who died 2 weeks later. His father ended his military service to return home to care for Johnny and his sister. Mr. Chapman remarried and gave Johnny 10 more siblings.

In 1792, 18 year old Johnny convinced his half brother, age 11, to go west. The 2 boys led a nomadic life until Mr. Chapman brought his brood to Ohio where Johnny and his brother were. A farm was purchased and Johnny's brother stayed to help his father. Johnny was introduced to his career as an apple orchardist when his father had him apprentice with a Mr. Crawford.



While the popular image of Johnny Appleseed is spreading seeds randomly everywhere he wandered, truth be told he was a shrewd real estate developer. He planted over 100,000 square miles of apple orchards in

Western Pennsylvania, Ohio and Indiana.

He started planting nurseries, built fences around them to protect them from livestock and left them in the care of neighbors who sold trees on shares. He returned every year or 2 to tend to his real estate.

His apples were grown from seed and were rarely sweet or tasty rather they were just the thing to produce hard cider or apple jack. So in addition to being a real estate mogul he was tycoon of the tipsy beverages.
